Bryan Chapman, Assistant Police Chief, Phoenix Police Department, Phoenix, AZ



Bryan Chapman is a 28-year public safety veteran and currently serves as an Assistant Chief with the Phoenix Police Department. He began his career in Phoenix in 1999 and has held assignments in Central City & Mountain View Precincts, Violent Crimes Bureau, Family Investigations Bureau, Downtown Operations Unit, and the Training Bureau. Prior to service with Phoenix, he served four years as a police officer and detective with the Bowling Green Police Division in Ohio.

In 2019, Chapman was promoted to Commander and held assignments in the Property Crimes Bureau, Center for Continuous Improvement and the Training Bureau. He was

promoted to Assistant Chief in 2021 and assigned to the Organizational & Professional Development Division with responsibility over the Employment Services Bureau, the Training Bureau, the Organizational Integrity Bureau and he is the Executive Officer assigned to the Department of Justice Inquiry.
